






The Trenton, Pennington, and Hopewell Railway Company was chartered in 1902. The track on Broad Street was completed in 1904, and the line served borough residents until 1924. This view shows the trolley approaching the center of town, at Mercer Street. A round trip to Trenton cost 10 cents.





Weart's Store, located on the site of the present-day Hopewell Sunoco station, was constructed ca. 1856-7. The store was occupied by Nelson D. Blackwell, Farley F. Holcombe, and Ed Titus. Other owners were L. Gerhart and the Lowe Brothers.






